Having taken 3 of the IMPACT AAPI pathway LinC courses at De Anza (LART 211, YLA 2012, EWRT 1A/ICS 24 LinC), how have these courses and experiences benefited you both educationally and personally?

If there are any AAPI students who just started their college life and didn't know which courses to take, I would highly recommend that they start with the IMPACT AAPI pathways. As a new immigrant, the experience I have had throughout these courses [have] helped me prepare for my new life... [If] a person like me can do well when following the courses offered, everyone can do it too.

How has IMPACT AAPI helped you learn to become more civically aware and engaged?

My group project in Youth Leadership Academy (YLA) 2012 was to convince the audience why we had to raise the minimum wage to ten dollars in San Jose. As part of our preparation, we created the webpage and made the video to raise the voters' awareness about this community issue. We also attended the "Time for Ten" Kick-off Campaign and interviewed participant[s] there. As a result, not only did we all receive a good score...we also felt engaged [in] the community by mobilizing people to vote. Later on, I also took the opportunity to become a phone banker. [I] asked the Vietnam[ese] families to participate in the November 6th Election. By seeing what I can do for my community I feel happy because I can contribute my little work to make the voices of AAPI and, in particular, the Vietnamese community heard in society.

APIASF Scholarship

The Partnership for Equity in Education through Research (PEER) program is working through the National Commission of Asian American and Pacific Islander Research in Education (CARE) to partner with the Asian Pacific Islander American Scholarship Fund (APIASF) to award 45 Asian American Pacific Islander (AAPI) students at De Anza College a scholarship of \$2,500. The scholarship recipients will be tracked during their time at De Anza College. The data information collected will allow PEER to study how the scholarship award impacts the students' ability to graduate and/or transfer to a 4-year institution. The award winners will be announced in early December. An award ceremony will be held in their honor (Date: TBA).
