

Fundamentals of Digital Security

CIS 46.64Z (CRN: 48292) – Distance Course Spring, 2024

An Online class that Opens in Canvas at 12:01 AM on April 6 (the “official” start date for campus is April 8). The Final is on June 27, 2024.

Office hours: (1) via “Zoom” on Canvas, and (2) via e-mail.

COURSE STRUCTURE

This is an “asynchronous” online course in which all events other than office hours and tests will be available at asynchronous times. (“Asynchronous” means that you can do all class activities at the times you choose to do them as long as you do not fall outside the boundaries specified for each activity.) You will be asked to complete 15 laboratory assignments, take 10 Unit Quizzes, and take a Midterm and Final during the quarter. Additional work will allow you to earn extra credit points.

The course will use the Canvas system, but the full course will not be open in Canvas until the official class start date on April 6, 2024. When you do open the course in Canvas after registering, you will find that all but the first block of the course is “grayed out” and inaccessible. I strongly recommend that you watch the videos about the class and the labs I have provided in that first block of the Canvas course. I also strongly recommend that you obtain a copy of the text before the class begins, and purchase access to the virtual labs also. Before the rest of the course “unlocks” for you, (1) the date must be April 6 or later, and (2) you must have seen the online videos on the syllabus and how to do the labs and completed the “student contract” in which you verify that you have read and understand the major content of the syllabus. Only then will you have access to the blocks for the 10 Units of the course.

PREREQUISITE SKILLS

Advisory: CIS 108, ESL 261 and ESL 265, or ESL 461 and ESL 465, or eligibility for EWRT 1A or EWRT 1AH or ESL 5. Much of the class involves the use of “command prompt” interfaces on virtual Linux and Windows systems, so some familiarity with the keyboard is necessary. Although no specific skills are required by the labs, a good general knowledge of how computers and the Internet work will definitely help you digest and retain the course content more effectively.

You will be accessing this site via MyPortal/Canvas. Various other links and materials will be added at this class site. You will turn in your completed assignments to the Canvas site, all tests will be conducted via this site, and your grades and scored laboratory sheets will be available at this site. It will be the center point for communications about the course.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

The required steps you must take in order for me to consider you as being enrolled in CIS46 is for you to complete the “Student Contract” quiz in Canvas and view both of the introductory lectures before Unit 1. Of course, you must also satisfy the De Anza rules for registration to be added to the class roster.

Drop Policy: By midnight on Friday of the second week (April 19, 2024), you will have completed watching the films on Canvas and the quiz entitled “Student Contract for CIS 46” posted on the Canvas. Failure to do so may result in a DROP as it means you have not attended class. Your first lab is also due on the Friday of that week (4/19/2024). You have a 5-day reprieve on handing in Labs (i.e., the final deadline for Lab01 is midnight 4/24/2024), although you will forfeit points whenever Labs are late. No Lab will receive credit if handed in after the deadline date. More on this topic appears in “**Submitting Weekly Laboratory Assignments/Late Work**”, below.

REQUIRED COURSE MATERIALS

Textbook: Computer Security Fundamentals, 4th Edition by Chuck Easttom, Pearson IT Cybersecurity Curriculum. (ISBN-13: 978-0135774779). This is available at the campus bookstore and also comes in a variety of formats at Amazon for around \$45. The quickest method may be to purchase an e-edition, which you can access immediately.

Lab: The lab can be purchased directly from infoseclearning.com and will not be available from the campus bookstore. You can purchase access from Infoseclearning.com by getting into our course on Canvas and going to any of the fifteen links to labs (you must do the Student Contract during the first week before you can open these labs) which are labeled with the text “Lab *nn* Access: *Title of specific lab*”. Once you click on the link to the virtual lab, InfoSecLearning will automatically begin to create an account for you. You will only authenticate this one time. You will need either a credit or debit card and it will cost about \$88. InfosecLearning also uses its own codes to identify classes, and the4 code for this class is OVESIAOLVZ. After this first authentication, to access the labs you will simply click on the link in Canvas and will be taken

directly to the lab that is indicated with no further authentication. You must always be logged into Canvas and access our class site within Canvas to access the labs.

Once you have access to the virtual laboratory via any of the 15 “*Lab n Access: ...*” links found on the Canvas web page for CIS 46 you will have access for the length of your subscription (6 months). I have arranged for the canvas site for this class to remain active for that period of time because you will then be able to use the virtual systems in many more ways than to simply complete the required exercises.

One thing that you may wish to do is earn extra credit by doing the “capture-the-flag” exercises in the virtual labs. To get credit for this, you must link your personal account at InfoSecLearning.com to the course and to me. Instructions for this are found in a PDF posted in the initial block you access for this course on Canvas. It is entitled ‘**How to link your virtual lab account to me so that I can give you credit for doing the "Challenge capture-the-flag exercises".**’

RELATED ACCESS ISSUES

If you are unable to register, please email InfoSecLearning at info@infoseclearning.com. If you do have access to the labs and encounter a technical problem with the labs, you can simply click on the blue “hamburger” (3 horizontal bars on top of one another in a circle) symbol at the upper right corner of the “lab instructions” window which will pull down a menu. The bottom item on the menu is “Help Desk”.

Canvas and the Virtual Lab Site: As noted above, Canvas will be used for completing all class assignments. This site also allows you to create discussion forums or chat rooms with other class members. I encourage you to use regular email to reach me rather than the Canvas messaging capability – it is much faster and allows you to include attachments, which may not get through Canvas. I almost always have my iPhone nearby and will respond to regular email quickly at most times.

Hardware and Software Requirements: Although a tablet will work for much of what you must do in this course, it is awkward to use in the labs where a keyboard and relatively large display is necessary. (I do have a wireless keyboard that I use with my iPads, but although I suspect it will work (I do run Chrome on iOS, but I have never attempted to do any labs with it.)

Software: The software required for this class is:

(1) **Chrome web browser** (download from <https://www.google.com/intl/en/chrome/browser/#eula>).

(2) You will need **MS Word** or a tool that produces output compatible with MS Word (.DOC, .DOCX or .RTF files), like Apache **Open Office** or **OfficeLibre**. (Please note that I will expect that the formatting I place on the lab template documents will remain on your submitted labs: I will exact penalty points for labs that have changed formatting.)

(3) **Microsoft PowerPoint** (even older versions work fine) on a computer with a microphone to record audio will be required if you wish to earn extra credit by recording audio PowerPoint presentations.

Please note that all students who obtain a De Anza e-mail address can install Microsoft Office 365 (“software as a service” via the Internet) **free of charge**.

WAYS TO EARN POINTS TOWARD A GRADE

This course will require the completion of 15 “hands-on” lab assignments in which you will be using hacking software tools. You will also take Unit quizzes and will take midterm and final exams. Finally, in addition to these graded activities, you be given the opportunity to earn additional “extra credit” points by doing some extra work in the labs (“capture the flag” points), and by researching and presenting additional information about tools and various hacking issues currently being discussed in the press and on the web to the class. The points earned from “for-credit” items and extra-credit items are summarized in the table shown below.

SUBMITTING LABORATORY ASSIGNMENTS

This course uses a virtual environment ("sandbox") provided by InfoSecLearning to accompany the textbook, and all 15 labs will require access to this environment via Canvas. All course information, including assignments, course deadlines, etc. will be made available to you online via the Canvas course web site you enter via "myPortal". There, you will find the assignments that you will be asked to complete, listed within each Unit module of the Quarter. The actual course schedule and due dates for exams and assignments are subject to change and will be posted in the schedule in this course syllabus on Canvas. Each week's lab assignment(s) will require you to use the virtual environment and do multiple screen captures, which you will use to document your actions there, as well as answer specific questions about the lab session. You will then crop and paste portions of the captured screen images into the Lab Report you assemble using the MS Word template provided for that lab in the Unit for that week, answer the questions printed there, and post the resulting MS Word formatted document to satisfy the assignment at the link that reads "Lab0*n* (Required or Extra Credit) Report Turn-in". You will find a video that details how to prepare the lab reports in an introductory block for this course in Canvas.

Each Lab will have both a "due date" and a "deadline" date associated with it. The "deadline" date represents the date beyond which no labs will be accepted for scoring. Your job is simply to stay ahead of the "due dates" (and most importantly, the "deadline" dates). Failure to post any required (i.e., not extra credit) Lab may result in your being unable to access later course materials.

The Grading of Labs:

I will usually get the labs that are submitted before the due date graded, record the scores and upload the marked copies for you to read within 48 hours of the time they were due. (You will find your marked copy in exactly the same place you submitted it in the Canvas page.) The marked-up copy of your original submission will use colors to highlight comments and show where the points are earned. (Green for credit, orange for comments, red when pointing out things that you got wrong.) I also ask you to fill in your name in the blank that is labelled "Name" with your name (it is useful to know who submitted it). This will contribute to your score on the lab.

Late Work

Lab reports and extra credit labs will be accepted after the due date according to the following rules: Ten percent (10%) of the maximum possible points will be subtracted for each working day (24 hours) the assignment is late. This will continue until 5 days have elapsed beyond the due date, when the points total will drop to zero and no credit will be earned. If you have clear and compelling reasons for not getting an assignment in on time, **please let me know on or before the day it is due**, and I will arrange an extension for you.

EXTRA CREDIT ASSIGNMENTS

There are two ways you can earn extra credit points: (1) by doing the “Challenge” (“capture the flag”) exercises for any or all of the 15 Labs in this course (2.5 points per lab), and (2) by doing extra credit presentations in the form of PowerPoints with your audio narrative added. The extra credit lab reports will be submitted via Canvas in the same way that your regular lab reports will be submitted. Extra credit points earned by doing the “Challenge, capture-the-flag” exercises will be retained by the InfosecLearning virtual lab servers, which I will access for grading. **If you wish to earn these extra credit points, you must take time to connect your account on the virtual systems to this class by using my e-mail, as discussed in the PDF posted in Canvas entitled “Students Linking to Instructors”.**

“Challenge” Exercises for Extra Credit: If you choose to do so, the “Challenge” exercises for each of the fifteen Labs (including the Extra Credit Labs) will be “capture the flag” exercises done as part of the InfoSecLearning Lab. The challenge results are recorded at the InfoSecLearning site, after which you can access your score. Although I will have access to those scores for grading if you have connected it as discussed above, you will also be able to view your “flag points” earned at the virtual laboratory site.

Audio-augmented PowerPoint presentations for Extra Credit: Unlike the lab extra credits, this form of Extra Credit will be prepared as a PowerPoint presentation of an approved topic (see below), with an audio recording of your voice making the presentation, which I will post for the full class to access. (Even older versions of PowerPoint permit the recording of your voice for presentations: all you need is a laptop with a built-in microphone, or an external microphone with either USB or audio jack. I strongly recommend the latter, as the sound quality of built-in microphones is often not good.) You will upload a PowerPoint presentation that has been augmented with your own voice recording, explaining each slide, with no more than 10-minutes time being taken for the full presentation.

Extra Credit work will be posted on topics that are truly substantive and that target specific security issues pertinent to this course. These Extra Credit topics will include:

- (1) The analysis and demonstration of the accomplishment of significant hacks on hackthissite.org or a similar site (e.g., accomplishment of a “realistic” hack on HackThisSite), or
- (2) The demonstration of, and/or installation of, and/or use of, and/or analysis of, major tools used in hacking (like Wireshark, Metasploit, Kali Linux, the setting up of a lab to test tools [“virtual” is optimal], exploits, etc.), or
- (3) The reporting and technical analysis of major events and issues in the digital security realm (e.g., analysis of a major new exploit),

All Extra Credit presentations **will require my prior approval of the topic via email** and will be posted to the Canvas site to earn extra credit points. If it is accepted for credit, I will also make your report available to the full class.

I will accept a maximum of only 5 Extra Credit presentation submissions per week for the full class (priority is in the order I receive them), and you cannot submit any more than one per week. I will accept a maximum of 5 Presentation Extra Credits from any one person for the quarter.

For each unit, the materials should be accessed and completed before the listed “deadline” dates. The following sequence is recommended:

1. Read the Chapter(s) for this Unit
2. Watch my lecture(s) for this Unit
3. Do the Lab(s) for this Unit, filling out the Lab Report with text answers and captures and posting the filled-n lab sheet at correct spot on the Canvas site: In Canvas it will read “*Lab On Report Turn-in (due ...)*”. The grading of each of the labs may take several workdays before a score is posted but are usually completed within 48 hours.
4. You may miss “deadline” dates. If you do, and have not made prior arrangements, Canvas will not accept them at later times/dates, and you must simply accept that these will be recorded as zeroes in your course gradebook. If you have a compelling reason to miss a deadline date (“my chihuahua ate the keyboard!”, “I had hiccups!”, “demented, flesh-eating aliens abducted my mother-in-law!”) – I will consider whether it is an appropriate reason to grant an extension and cut you some slack if it is.
5. Take the Unit Quiz after completing the Lab(s) for the Unit.

Testing and Grading Policies

To pass this course, you must complete the assignments, quizzes, and final exam. I will calculate the percentage of the total “required” 600 points that you have earned after adding all your earned points. (You can earn as many as 687.5 points when we include extra credit, so your percentage may rise above 100%). Deadlines for all assignments will be posted via Canvas and this syllabus.
