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
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nda Jozovich case vields no new hopes

Editor-in-Chief Six months ago today, De An-College student Linda Ann ozovich disappeared from a San-Clara Mervyns' employee rking lot.

An extensive search, a reward \$20,000, and consultations renowned psychics have failed to yield any substantial clues to her fate.

"Some days, I have a lot of hope, some days, I'm very realistic," said her mother, Sue Jozovich.

"Two witnesses gave separate descriptions of a man seen in the vicinity of the suspected abduction, and both came up the ame," she said.

But the composite drawing was circulated by police and ran the San Jose Mercury with no msitive results.

"Linda was just in the wrong place at the wrong time," said Santa Clara Police Sergent Wayne Britt, who has been in charge of the investigation.

The case is not closed, but there's just nothing left to investigate, no clues, not a trace of evidence that hasn't been checked out, according to the police.

Linda left her station in Mervyns' sportswear department to phone a friend during her 7:30 p.m. break last November 6, and did not return. Police found her 1973 Datsun three days later bandoned in San Jose.

Her purse was dumped on the ar floor and her coat was in the back seat. Nothing was missing from the purse. The county crime aboratory could not match the igerprints found on the car.

Hundreds of friends searched lensively and passed out 14,000 leaflets trying to locate Linda or someone who had seen her.

Psychic Kathlyn Rhea told the family that Linda had been raped and murdered.

The events of the last six months leave little hope for linda's parents and four sisters for ever filling that empty spot in their Cupertino household. Intercultural division works
